

# Annual School Report 2023

The following report is prepared according to the School's Annual Reporting Policy and the NSW Government's Education Act. It provides general information to the community about the School's ethos and character and its performance in Academic and Financial terms. 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#### **Our Context**

#### From the Principal: Dr E J Boyce

During 2023, we have sought to understand the meaning of the concept of 'Hope through Grace'. In my understanding of the Bible, this concept is related to what we read in Ephesians 2:8-9, which teaches us these words, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith - and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God - not by works, so that no one can boast." In this passage, we learn that our hope is based on God's grace, and this comes only through the exercise of faith in God's provision for us. Therefore, from a Biblical point of view, we can only have true hope through God's grace.

Interestingly, verse 10 of this passage goes on to explain "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." In the context of this understanding, we are to live in hope because of God's grace and our acceptance of that grace through faith. Moreover, the outworking of this faith and hope is in the activity of good works that is blessing others by the way we serve them. Therefore, the way in which a community and the individuals of that community are reflecting God's truth, is when we show our hope in Christ as a reflection of the grace of God.

In the practical outworking of this truth, we will therefore fulfil our responsibilities as our celebration of God's grace in order to bring glory to God. At Pacific Hills Christian School and New Hope Christian School and the remaining Pacific Group of Christian Schools, we observe this outworking of grace and hope in our relationships within these School communities. This means, that we will be examples of these characteristics in front of the children and each other, and particularly with visitors to our School. The ways in which we encourage one another, students, staff and school families will therefore reflect both the grace of God to us and the ways in which we manage the children in their learning and in their serving.

Daily, I am delighted with the actions that show that we are a community of hope by the faith of our people and the practice of our gifts to bless others in so many different circumstances. I see this activity by so many individuals as people are seeking to be faithful to God's call on their lives. I would encourage people, adults and staff of our School to constantly reflect the grace of God by living with hope for our sake and the sake of others particularly with the new generation coming through.

#### About our School

Pacific Hills is a transdenominational Christian School that has been in operation since 1979. Its vision is to provide a Christian educational community as a centre of teaching, learning and serving excellence, founded on Biblically-based beliefs, values and behaviour. It is committed to authentic Christianity, to excellence in education and to genuine community.

Seeking to transform the hearts and minds of its students through instruction in the Truth and the experience of gracious Christian care within the bounds of high expectations, the School prioritises stewardship of individual talent for the glory of God and in service of others.

Pacific Hills offers a comprehensive learning experience delivered by strong Christian teachers supported by excellent facilities.

#### Characteristics of our Student Body

Pacific Hills is a Prep to Year 12 co-educational school located in a semi-rural setting in north-west Sydney. In 2023, 1369 full time students were enrolled, with a slightly higher rate of boys at 53% to girls at 47% across the School. In addition, 44% of students have a language background other than English, while 1% of students identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islanders,


Our curriculum intentionally explores Christian principles in all learning areas. With only Christian teachers, students are supported in exploring their own and others' underlying beliefs in the content and context of what is learned. Pastoral Care of each student is a priority, extending beyond simple student welfare to include intentional Character Education, character founded in Christian belief.


The School has a strong program of Service. Students are taught to understand that striving to achieve excellence is best done when honouring God and in service of others. A comprehensive Community Service program operates and Mission teams seek to serve other communities in the State, the Nation and overseas.

#### **Our Outcomes and Results**

#### Student Outcomes in Standardised National Literacy and Numeracy Testing

Students completed the National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests. The table shows the average student results at Pacific Hills Christian School for 2023. The cell colour shows how the school's results compare to those of students with a similar background.

#### The Granting of Records of School Achievement (ROSA)

Schools in NSW provide individual assessments for each student enrolled at the conclusion of Year 10. This information is retained by the NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) and is issued to students when they leave the secondary schooling system. At this point students will be eligible to apply for a Record of School Achievement.

In Year 10, the ROSA grades are allocated by the school using school-based assessments and aligning student performance with the Course Performance Descriptors. The school-based assessment schedules are issued to students in a Year 10 Assessment Handbook.

On the completion of the Year 11 Course, students are given a Preliminary Course Grade. The grades allocated will be in line with the Preliminary Common Grade Scale and based on student performance in their School Assessment Program. The school-based assessment schedules are made available to students in the Year 11 Assessment Handbook. Students who leave at the end of the Year 11 Course are entitled to apply for a Preliminary ROSA.

The ROSA is a cumulative credential for Years 10-12 for students leaving school prior to the HSC. The School issued 3 Records of School Achievement in 2023.

#### Results of the Higher School Certificate

The HSC cohort of 2023 achieved some outstanding results across a wide range of subject areas. There were 118 students who completed HSC courses in 2023 including 18 Year 11 Augustine students who completed a selection of courses as part of the Acceleration program. 30 HSC courses were offered at Pacific Hills in 2023. The Highest ATAR was 99.55.

#### Distinguished Achievers List:

- PHCS students achieved 61 Band 6 results (or Band E4) and were mentioned on the Distinguished Achievers List. These top band results were achieved by 34 students of whom 7 were Augustine Acceleration students (Year 11).
- 25% of Year 12 students received Band 6 results in at least one of their subjects.
- 18 Augustine students studied Mathematics, Mathematics Extension 1 and Physics and received 13 mentions on the <u>Distinguished Achievers List</u> (Band 6 or E4 results).

#### Outstanding Band 6 Results:

- Above State average in Band 6 Ancient History (School 33.33%, State 9.18%) 9 students.
- Above State average in Band 6 Visual Arts (School 37.5%, State 18.46%) 8 students.
- Above State average in Band 6 English EAL/D (School 33.33%, State 4.94%) 3 students.
- Above State average in Band E4 English Ext 2 (School 50%, State 28.79%) 2 students.
- Above State average in Band E4 English Ext 1 (School 50%, State 40.81%) 8 students.
- Above State average in Band 6 Mathematics Ext 2 (School 44.44%, State 37.77%) 9 students.
- Above State average in Band 6 PDHPE (School 12.82%, State 6.37%) 39 students.
- Above State average in Band 6 Software (School 18.18%, State 12.08%) 11 students.

Pacific Hills presented 30 subjects for this year's HSC. 73% of subjects were at or above State average.

#### Post-school Destinations

- Year 12 2023 finished strong with many students receiving multiple offers for further study via Early Entry schemes and the UAC system (including the School's Recommendation Scheme).
  - 31 students received an offer to study via Macquarie University's Leaders & Achievers early entry scheme.
- Macquarie University was the overwhelmingly dominant choice for our students, followed by the University of New South Wales, University of Technology, Western Sydney University, and the Australian Catholic University.
- Students from 2023 are now enrolled in a range of courses (listed in order of popularity):
  - Health (including Nutrition, Nursing, Pharmacy and Occupational Therapy)

- o Science and Engineering
- o Society and Culture (Media and Communication, Psychology, Law)
- o Management and Commerce
- Those students who do not go on to tertiary studies are now involved in a range of different areas including:
  - o Traineeships and apprenticeships
  - o Bible college and church based gap year programs
  - Volunteer and paid work

#### Management of Student Non-Attendance

The School adopts an attitude of close liaison with families in managing student attendance. Absences are noted daily and followed up both by phone and by written correspondence. Parents are required to provide written explanation of the absences by email, text, written note, or through the School Management System.

### **Our Community Satisfaction**

The School continues to engage with McCrindle Research to conduct an annual survey of parents and staff. In 2023 the survey received 215 responses. Overall, 90% of respondents indicated they were satisfied with their experience at the School. The highest levels of satisfaction were in response to the following areas:

- How the School demonstrates its values (92%)
- How the uniform represents the School within the community (91%)
- The School's approach to teaching, learning and serving (91%)
- How my School connects with the broader Pacific Group of Christian Schools network (88%).

#### Parent Satisfaction

In 2023, the Christ-centred community remains the top strength for parents, with 75% of stakeholders seeing this as one the key strengths of their school. This is followed by the nurturing environment and sense of community. According to parents, areas for continued development included student academic achievement and innovative use of technology.

#### Teacher Satisfaction

In the 2023 McCrindle Survey, teachers noted that a sense of community (78%) and an emphasis on service to the school community and beyond (71%) are key strengths of the school. According to teachers, areas for continued development include a consistent approach to discipline and the need for strategic planning for the growth the School is experiencing.

#### Student Satisfaction

Students are also surveyed at the end of their Year 12 schooling. The School also has strong student leadership programs that allow for student feedback and improvement.


These are examples of the of the comments made by Year 12 students:


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Recurrent/Capital Income










# Recurrent/Capital Expenditure







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
