
Pacific Hills offers a comprehensive learning experience delivered by strong Christian teachers supported by excellent facilities.


Characteristics of our student body

The School is organised into three sub-schools, Junior, Middle and Senior. Junior School covers Prep to Year 4, Middle School Year 5 to Year 8 and Senior School Year 9 to 12. In 2024 there were 1449 students in total with four streams from Kindergarten to Year 6 and six streams from Year 7 to 12. There are approximately equal numbers of boys and girls with 1% of the student population being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

Theme 2: Our Outcomes and Results:

Student outcomes in standardised national literacy and numeracy testing Students completed the National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests. The table shows the average student results at Pacific Hills Christian School for 2024. The cell colour shows how the School's results compare to those of students with a similar background. The PHCS NAPLAN results show students performing Above and Well Above all Australian students in all areas in the 2024 NAPLAN testing.

Results of the Higher School Certificate

- The top ATAR at PHCS was 99.2
- PHCS students achieved 57 Band 6 (or E4) results.
- A third of Pacific Hills students received an ATAR between 80 and 100

Distinguished Achievers List

- PHCS students achieved 57 Band 6 results (or Band E4) and were mentioned on the Distinguished Achievers List.
- 29 students received Band 6 results in at least one of their subjects.
- 28 accelerated students studied Mathematics, Mathematics Extension 1 and Chemistry and 15 of these students received 31 mentions on the <u>Distinguished Achievers List</u>.

Outstanding Band 6 results

- Above State average in Band 6 Engineering Studies (School 22.22%, State 9.72%)
- Above State average in Band E4 English Ext 2 (School 66.66%, State 33.89%)
- Above State average in Band 6 Mathematics Advanced (School 34%, State 22.3%)
- Above State average in Band 6 Chemistry (School 15.15%, State 11.41%)

Post-school destinations

- Year 12 2024 finished strongly with many students receiving multiple offers for further study via Early Entry schemes and the UAC system (including the School's Recommendation Scheme)
 - o 42 students received offers from Western Sydney University
 - o 36 students received offers from Macquarie University
 - o 13 students received offers from Notre Dame University
 - o 12 students received offers through UAC's School Recommendation Scheme
- Macquarie University was the overwhelmingly dominant choice for our students, followed by the University of Technology, University of Sydney, University of New South Wales, Western Sydney University, and the Australian Catholic University.
- Students from 2024 are now enrolled in a range of courses (listed in order of popularity):
 - Society and Culture (Media and Communication, Psychology, Law)
 - o Management and Commerce
 - o Health (including Nutrition, Nursing, Pharmacy and Occupational Therapy)
 - Education
 - Science and Engineering

- Those students who do not go on to tertiary studies are now involved in a range of different areas including:
 - o Traineeships and apprenticeships
 - o Bible college and church-based gap year programs
 - Volunteer and paid work

Description of how school manages student non-attendance
The School adopts an attitude of close liaison with families in managing student
attendance. Absences are noted daily and followed up both by phone and by written
correspondence. Parents are required to provide written explanation of the absences
by email, text, written note, or through the School Management System.

Parent satisfaction

Parents say that the students are respectful – a strength of the School – and that a Christ-centred community is considered its top strength.

Positively, JS parents say that their students are strongly supported to navigate emerging technologies.

Parents also sight that student learning suffers due to teaching in old rooms.

Student satisfaction

Typically, student response at PHCS is positive.

"I have been a part of Pacific Hills for a long time. One thing I love about this school is the dedication and care from teachers, helping students to grow academically and also spiritually in their walk with Christ.

I love the opportunities students are given to pursue their interests, from the sports field to performing arts and service trips. The School's focus on God helps create an engaging Christian community, bringing the best out of us as students." (Year 8 student)

"The community in Pacific Hills offers a safe and supported space for students to thrive both spiritually and academically. The School provides many opportunities for students to serve others in mission trips, as well as a lot of chances to showcase their God-given abilities.

A service activity I have been involved in included travelling to Pacific Brook in Muswellbrook to help coordinate the Swimming Carnival for the students there. I really enjoyed serving the people there and being connected to other students as part of the Pacific Group of Schools." (Year 8 student)

As reflected in these quotes from students, the School has a positive learning culture.

There are a few cases, where students have had a negative experience due to their classroom involvement. This is indicated when students are no longer a part of the School community and parents have listed this on the School exit form.

Teacher satisfaction

Almost 88% enjoy coming to work each day and 86% find their work satisfying and fulfilling.

72% strongly or somewhat agree that their work life balance is somewhat respected.


74% are extremely or very satisfied that the School demonstrates its values and 68% are extremely or very satisfied with their experience at Pacific Hills Christian School.

The above statistics have been taken from the Stakeholder Insights Study (November 2024) conducted by McCrindle Research.








Recurrent/Capital Expenditure
